

HITPlus – targeted street outreach for rough sleepers in Southwark, Lambeth and Lewisham

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Background – Why was the service needed

- Cohort of rough sleepers unable to access day centre services
- Rough sleepers not accessing primary health care services
- Street outreach workers experiencing difficulties accessing primary health care services for rough sleepers on their caseloads

(St Mungos, 2017)





Background – Why is this service needed cont

- Rough sleepers presenting to A+E in crisis
- Rough sleepers more likely to have increased hospital admissions

A study of the health needs of 933 people sleeping rough (across Westminster, Kensington and Chelsea, and Hammersmith and Fulham)

Visited A&E seven times as often as the general population



Were admitted to hospital more frequently





Background – Aims of project

- To target rough sleepers not accessing primary health care services
- To sign post rough sleepers to day centres to improve physical health and case worker support
- To signpost rough sleepers to primary health care services
- To reduce the burden on A+E services
- To reduce the secondary care usage of targeted rough sleepers
- To provide health education, promotion and assessments to rough sleepers



How did it begin?

- Piloted from June to October 2017
- Increased engagement from rough sleepers
- Assisted with GP registrations
- GP appointments accessed
- Good outcomes being achieved
- Applied to join the QNI homeless health innovation projects



QNI Homeless Health Innovation Projects





10 nurse-led projects with QNI support





Outputs during project

- 77 patients seen for same day health checks
- 109 clients seen on the street whilst on outreach
- 69 health interventions completed including:
 - health assessments
 - Immunisations
 - making successful housing applications
 - supporting the addiction service / supporting commencement of opiate replacement therapy
 - wound assessment and management



Result?

- HIT Plus model was expanded into two other boroughs: Lambeth and Lewisham
- Project was viewed sustainable and secured funding from the Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government's Rough Sleepers Initiative until 2020

- Robust data collection
- Applying for funding
- Provide training

 Developing the model of care in partnership

- Service profiled on 2 radio stations
- Featured on BBC London news
- Featured in the Time's Christmas Appeal in December 2018, with full article on the project

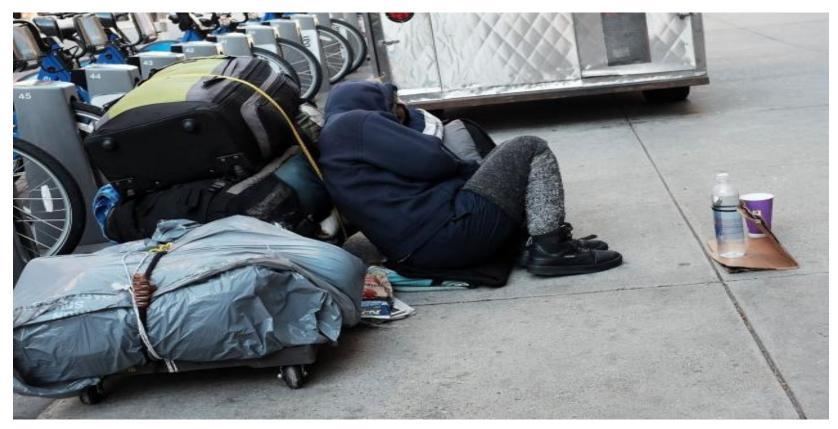

Case Study 1

- 29 Year old female rough sleeper
- Not registered with GP
- Respiratory symptoms

Interventions

- Health assessment
- Harm minimisation advice
- Treated via PGD for chest infection
- Info on GP and day centre services to access
- A+E attendance avoided



Case study 2

- 36 year old male client
- Rough sleeping
- Heroin dependent
- Not on a methadone script
- Needs to attend A+E for assessment
